1) The 5 most successful Summer Olympic athletes from the Czech Republic in the 21st century

Barbora Špotáková

Barbora Špotáková is considered one of the greatest javelin throwers in history. She won two Olympic gold medals at the Beijing 2008 and London 2012 Olympic Games and later added a bronze medal in Rio 2016. In total, she earned three Olympic medals. Špotáková also set the women's world record in the javelin throw, confirming her dominance in the sport for more than a decade.

Lukáš Krpálek is one of the most successful judokas in Olympic history. He won his first Olympic gold medal in the 100 kg category at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games. Four years later, he moved to the heavyweight category (100+ kg) and won another gold medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. His achievements in two different weight classes demonstrate his exceptional skill, strength, and dominance in judo.

Štěpánka Hilgertová

Štěpánka became one of the legends of Czech canoe slalom thanks to her long and successful career. Although she won her first Olympic gold medal in 1996, her victory at the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games confirmed her position among the greatest athletes of the 21st century. Competing in the K-1 category, Hilgertová remained one of the top canoeists in the world for more than two decades.

David Svoboda

David Svoboda is one of the most successful Czech athletes in modern pentathlon. This demanding sport combines five disciplines: fencing, swimming, horse riding, shooting, and running. Svoboda achieved the greatest success of his career at the London 2012 Olympic Games, where he won the gold medal and became an Olympic champion.

Jiří Prskavec

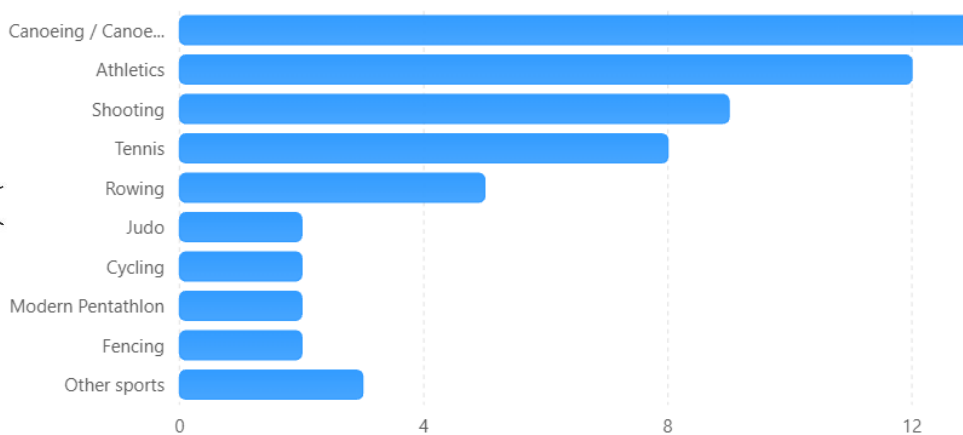

Jiří Prskavec is considered the face of modern Czech water slalom and one of the most successful canoeists of his generation. Competing in the K-1 category, he became known for his technical precision, speed, and calm performances under pressure. After winning a bronze medal at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games, Prskavec reached the peak of his career at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, where he delivered an almost flawless run and won the gold medal. His success continued the strong Czech tradition in canoe slalom and inspired a new generation of athletes.

2) The 5 most successful Winter Olympic athletes from the Czech Republic in the 21st century

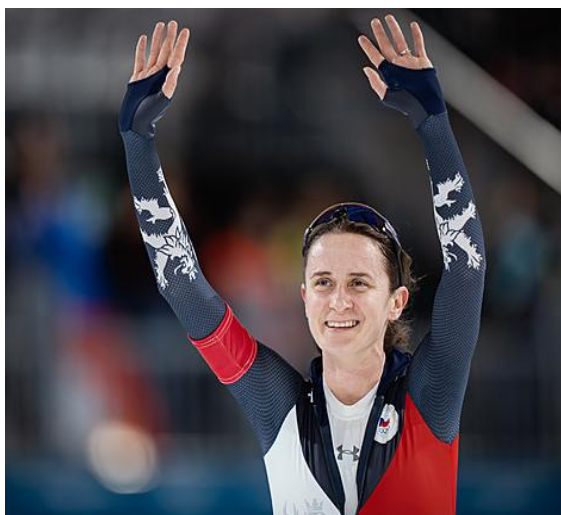
Ester Ledecká

Jaromír Jágr

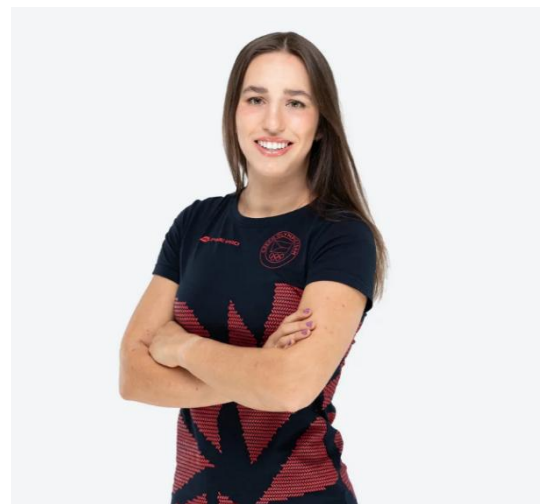

Zuzana Maděrová

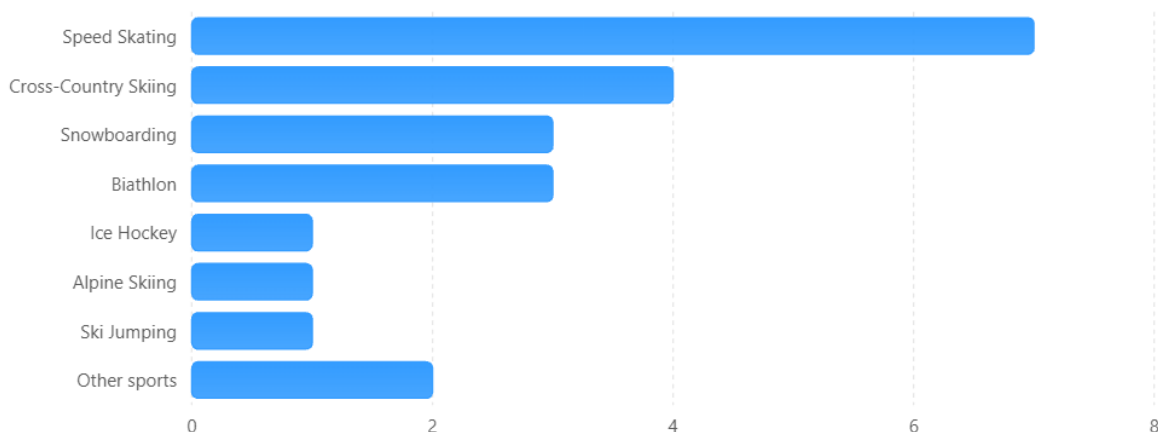

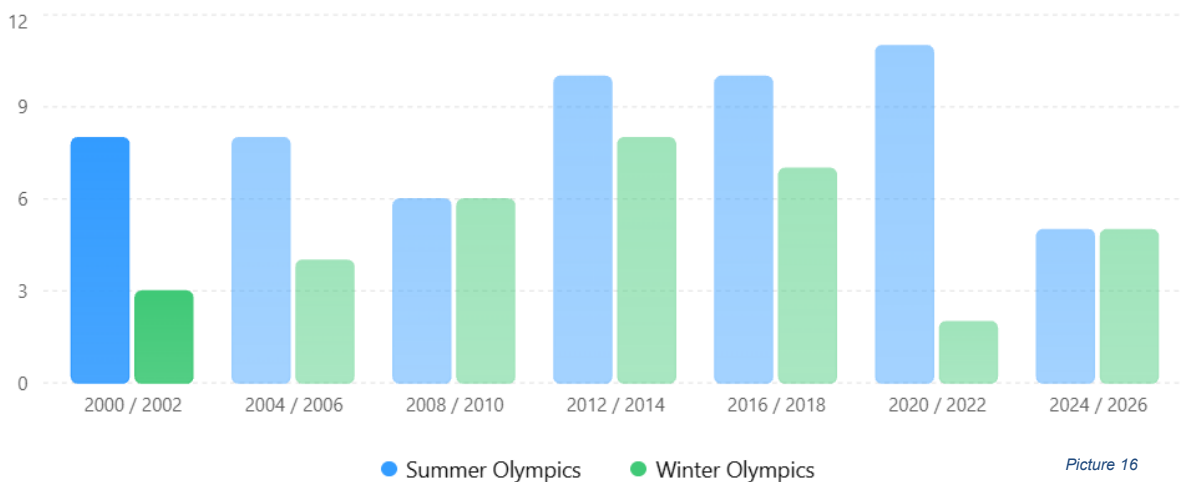

Achievements from the Olympic Games

- ⁶ *One of the most inspiring comeback stories in modern Czech sport is the journey of Eva Adamczyková. In December 2021, she suffered a devastating injury during a World Cup race in Austria, breaking both of her ankles only weeks before the Beijing 2022 Winter Olympics. Many people believed that her professional snowboardcross career might be over.*

Adamczyková was forced to miss the Olympic Games and spent more than a year recovering and rebuilding her strength. The rehabilitation process was extremely difficult, as she had to learn how to fully walk, train, and compete again. Despite the pain and doubts surrounding her future, she made an incredible return to international competition.

Her comeback became one of the greatest stories of determination in Czech sports history when she won the silver medal in snowboardcross at the Milano-Cortina 2026 Winter Olympics. Her success proved not only her talent, but also her extraordinary mental strength and fighting spirit.

3) Popular Sports In The Czech Republic

Football

The Czech Republic has a strong football tradition and is especially famous for producing technically talented midfielders and world-class goalkeepers. Czech footballers have achieved success in some of the biggest European clubs and international tournaments, helping to build the country's reputation in world football.

One of the greatest Czech players of the modern era is Pavel Nedvěd, known as the “Czech Fury” for his energy, determination, and powerful long-range shots. In 2003, he won the Ballon d'Or and became a legend at Juventus. Another iconic player is Petr Čech, considered one of the best goalkeepers in Premier League history. During his career at Chelsea, he won the UEFA Champions League and set the record for the most clean sheets in the English Premier League.

Tomáš Rosický, nicknamed “The Little Mozart,” was admired for his creativity, vision, and passing ability while playing for Borussia Dortmund and Arsenal. Czech football history also includes Antonín Panenka, who became world-famous after inventing the “Panenka penalty” during the 1976 European Championship final. Today, the biggest star of Czech football is Patrik Schick, whose spectacular goal from the halfway line at Euro 2020 became one of the most memorable moments of the tournament.

Most Famous Clubs (Teams)

The highest football competition in the Czech Republic is the Chance Liga. The league is traditionally dominated by three major clubs: AC Sparta Prague, SK Slavia Prague, and FC Viktoria Plzeň. These clubs regularly compete for the national title and represent Czech football in European competitions such as the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Europa League.

AC Sparta Prague: AC Sparta Prague is historically the most successful football club in the Czech Republic. Founded in 1893, Sparta has won the highest number of domestic league titles and has a long tradition of competing in European tournaments. The club is famous for its strong youth academy and passionate supporters.

The Czech Republic has a very high number of registered football players compared to many European countries, showing how deeply football is connected to Czech culture and everyday life. Football is played by children, teenagers, and adults in thousands of local clubs across the country. The sport is not only an important form of entertainment, but also a way to bring communities together.



Floorball

Floorball is a popular indoor team sport played with a plastic ball and special floorball sticks. Two teams compete against each other, and the main goal is to score by getting the ball into the opponent's net. The game is very fast and requires speed, teamwork, good fitness, and quick reactions.



Brain Battle Arena¹³

Each team usually has five field players and one goalkeeper. Matches are played in three periods of twenty minutes. The ball is made of plastic and has small holes, while players use lightweight sticks to pass, control, and shoot the ball. Unlike other players, the goalkeeper does not use a stick and catches the ball with their hands. Floorball was created in Sweden during the 1970s and later became popular in many European countries, especially in the Czech Republic. The biggest international competition is the Floorball World Championship, held every two years.



The Czech Republic is considered one of the strongest floorball nations in the world. Famous Czech players include Filip Langer, who also plays in the Swedish league, and Adam Delong, a forward for Florbal Mladá Boleslav and the Czech national team. Among the most successful Czech clubs are Tatran Střešovice, the most successful club in Czech floorball history, and Florbal Mladá Boleslav, one of the strongest teams in recent years.

Athletics

Since the year 2000, Czech athletics has remained among the world's most respected athletic nations, especially in throwing disciplines and combined events. Modern Czech athletics is connected with professional training methods, sports science, and internationally successful athletes who regularly competed at the Olympic Games and World Championships. The Czech Republic has also hosted important international events, including the famous Golden Spike Ostrava meeting, which became one of the most prestigious athletics competitions in Europe.

One of the greatest Czech athletes of the modern era is Roman Šebrle. In 2001, he became the first athlete in history to score more than 9,000 points in the decathlon, achieving 9,026 points in Götzis. He later won the Olympic gold medal at the Athens 2004 Olympic Games and was



considered the “World’s Greatest Athlete” for many years. Another legendary athlete is Barbora Špotáková, one of the most successful javelin throwers in history. She won two Olympic gold medals in Beijing 2008 and London 2012. In 2008, she also set the women’s javelin world record of 72.28 metres, which still remains unbeaten in 2026. Her long and successful career made her a symbol of strength, determination, and consistency in Czech sport.

Zuzana Hejnová became famous as a specialist in the 400-metre hurdles. She won two World Championship gold medals in 2013 and 2015 and also earned an Olympic medal in London 2012. Her achievements proved that Czech athletes could successfully compete with the best sprinters and hurdlers in the world.

Ice hockey

Ice hockey is one of the most important and popular sports in the Czech Republic. The history of Czech hockey began at the end of the 19th century, when the first hockey clubs and competitions were established. Cena Jiřího Gutha-Jarkovského

The Cena Jiřího Gutha-Jarkovského is a special Czech sports award named after Jiří Guth-Jarkovský, an important promoter of sport and Olympic ideals in Czech history. This award focuses mainly on fair play, sportsmanship, and ethical behavior in sport. It honors athletes, coaches, and teams who demonstrate respect, honesty, and positive values during competitions. Unlike awards focused only on medals and victories, this prize highlights the importance of character and moral principles in sport. It reminds athletes and fans that respect and fair competition are just as important as winning.

Trenér roku (Coach of the Year)

Trenér roku (Coach of the Year) is an important Czech sports award that honors the best coaches in the country. The award recognizes coaches who achieve outstanding results with their athletes or teams at major international competitions such as the Olympic Games, World Championships, and European Championships. It highlights not only victories and medals, but also leadership, strategy, motivation, and long-term athlete development. Coaches play a crucial role behind the



scenes, helping athletes improve physically and mentally. This award reminds the public that sporting success is often the result of years of hard work between athletes and their coaches.

Síň slávy českého sportu

The Síň slávy českého sportu (Czech Sports Hall of Fame) honors legendary Czech athletes and coaches for their lifetime achievements and contribution to Czech sport. Only the most respected and successful sports personalities are included in the Hall of Fame. Famous members include long-distance runner Emil Zátopek, gymnast Věra Čáslavská, and other important figures who represented the country with extraordinary success. The Hall of Fame helps preserve the history of Czech sport and inspires younger generations to continue the tradition of excellence, dedication, and national pride.

Junior Sportovec roku (Junior Athlete of the Year)

Junior Sportovec roku (Junior Athlete of the Year) is an award that recognizes the most talented young athletes in the Czech Republic. The award is given to junior athletes who achieve excellent results in international youth competitions and show strong future potential. It encourages children and teenagers to participate in sports and motivates young athletes to continue improving their skills. Many winners later become successful professional athletes representing the Czech Republic at the Olympic Games and World Championships. The award highlights the importance of supporting young talent and developing the next generation of Czech sports stars.

5) Reflection: Sports and National Identity
